

Using New Media Tools to Track Radiological Sources in Moldova

CNS partnered with the Moldovan National Agency for Regulation of Nuclear and Radiological Activities (NARNRA) for a unique, first-of-its-kind project to locate and track radiological sources abandoned during the collapse of the Soviet Union.

Using new tools such as social media, internet searches, database software, and network analysis

tools, CNS researches identified twenty-five people with the most connections with former co-workers with access to sensitive radiological materials.

Analyzing Trade Data and Open-Source Information

The Vienna Center for Disarmament and Non-Proliferation and Project Alpha at King's College London held a workshop on June 27-28 focusing on the analysis of trade data and related open-source information to understand critical supply chains and improve nonproliferation trade-control efforts.



The workshop brought together practitioners working on the development and application of relevant analytical techniques and tools to promote non-proliferation objectives and effectively share information.
